Trustees' Report, incorporating the Directors' Report for the year ended 31 March 2012

The Trustees of Pecan present their report together with the financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2012.

Principal activity

The principal activity of the charity in the year under review was that of the provision of information, advice and guidance, training and assistance to unemployed persons and people from disadvantaged communities.

Trustees

The Trustees of the charity who held office during the year are disclosed on page 3.

Structure, Governance and Management

Governing Document

Pecan is a company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 12 June 1989 and registered as a charity on 21 July 1989. The company was established under a Memorandum of Association which established the objects and powers of the company and is governed under its Articles of Association. In the event of the company being wound up members are required to contribute an amount not exceeding £1 each.

Recruitment and Appointment of Members and Trustees

1 Members

The membership of the company is drawn from participating churches, each of which may nominate a maximum of 2 members. Members agree to the Churches Together basis of faith, and pay an annual subscription.

The members of the company act as guarantors to the liability of £1 each.

A majority of members present at an Annual General Meeting (AGM) and voting in favour of a nomination will enable the person nominated to become a member immediately after the voting procedure has been completed. The participating churches may be altered by a unanimous vote of all members of the Company present at the AGM.

2. The Board of Directors

The Directors of Pecan are also Trustees of the Charity.

The Board meet quarterly and in a number of sub-committees and set policy and direction for the charity, and oversee the work of the Executive

All the directors are Christians and church members of good standing; they help Pecan to maintain its Christian ethos and are not remunerated.

The Board of Directors ('The Board') is made up of members who have experience and expertise relating to Pecan's work in providing training and support for the marginalised and unemployed. The Board may appoint any member of the Company or any other suitable person, either as a replacement of a member or as an additional member to the Board. Such appointments must be confirmed by election at the next Annual General Meeting. Appointment of the Secretary is the Board's function.

New trustees are recruited by advertising through newsletters to our member and supporter network. The skills and mix of current trustees are regularly analysed and we try to recruit trustees with complementary skills and backgrounds.

The Board may delegate its powers to sub-committees consisting of members of the Board who have expertise in that particular area of management. All proceedings and decisions of the sub-committee are reported back to the Board's next meeting.

New trustees participate in a full induction programme upon appointment.

3. Senior Management

The day to day management of the charity is the responsibility of the Executive Director who is appointed by the Board.

Operational Structure

All programs of work are managed by project managers. Senior management provides support and oversight of projects, and ensures that standards are maintained across the organisation. Senior management also takes the lead on applying for new contracts and the strategic planning and monitoring of the organisation.

Pecan and other charities/organisations

In order to achieve Pecan's objectives, the charity works in partnership with many local, national and international organisations and government agencies whilst retaining a prime focus on our neighbourhood within the London region.

Risk Assessment

The charity maintains and actively monitors its risk register. The register is presented to the Board at each quarterly meeting by the Executive Director; significant risks are identified and actions agreed and monitored at subsequent meetings.

A Health and Safety update is also presented to the Board at each quartely meeting, along with any updates to related procedures and policies.

Objectives and Activities

Pecan's Charitable Objects

Pecan is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association. These state Pecan's main objectives:

- · To advance the Christian religion.
- The relief of unemployment for the benefit of the public in such ways as may be thought fit, including providing training and other assistance to help people find employment.
- The relief of poverty in particular among unemployed people.
- To preserve and protect the physical environment for the benefit of the public by the promotion of waste reduction, re-use, reclamation and recycling and the use of recycled products.

Policies to further our Objects

Pecan is a Christian organisation with the vision to help transform the lives of those we work with, many of whom face seemingly insurmountable barriers to realise their dreams; vulnerable groups such as ex-offenders and their families, refugees and asylum seekers, young people and the long term unemployed. We seek to enable each individual to achieve their full potential and through that to see the community they are a part of transformed.

All our projects seek to address the multiple needs of our participants and work towards their social inclusion, through the development of holistic projects. We work in partnership with the local church, supporting initiatives to meet the needs of the community, as well as seeking to be an advocate for those we work with by challenging inequality and injustice on a local and national level.

Over the last 22 years, we have shown ourselves to be successful in working with many hard-to-reach groups within the communities we serve, delivering skills training and services to those in need. In addition, as a Christian organisation we are committed to outworking our core values through our relationships with all those with whom we interact.

We are determined to outworking our vision and values over the long-term, committed to our organisational values of:

- Excellence pursuing excellence in all we do, by providing the highest quality of service to best support our participants, staff and the
 community
- Empowering seeing the individuals and communities we work with empowered to make their own choices and affect their own situation
- Equality & Diversity celebrating diversity and ensuring equal access to our services for all participants regardless of race, colour, nationality, ethnic origin, religion, gender, sexual orientation, age or disability
- Prayer prayer as a key foundation on which all our work is established and as an integral part of our life together
- Pioneering pioneering projects that find new ways to address the needs of our participants and work towards their social inclusion
- Accountability transparency, participation and learning across all areas of our work both internally and externally
- Advocacy using our voice and standing alongside our participants and the local community to influence issues impacting them
- Collaboration achieving our vision through partnership with the local community, churches and other groups and organisations
- Sustainability protecting the environment, promoting health and encouraging ethical lifestyles through initiatives such as Fairtrade

Objects for the year

Our strategic objectives are:

- 1) To address the multiple needs of our participants and work towards their social inclusion, through the development of holistic projects.
- 2) To work with and support the local church in meeting the practical needs of the community.
- 3) To challenge inequality and injustice on a local and national level, with and for our community.

In the year under review Pecan delivered 5 different projects working to provide advice, training and support into employment for our participants. The projects focused on working with the long term unemployed of all ages, ex-offenders and those with mental health issues. During the year we have continued to develop the Peckham Foodbank, in partnership with local churches, providing emergency support to a growing number of people in the community who find themselves unable to feed themselves and/or their family.

Our objective remains to serve as many people as we can by delivering high quality programs and seeing lives transformed. A further objective for the year was to develop our current contracts to enable them to perform well during their lifetimes and to identify ways in which Pecan could secure further funding to carry our work going forward. This included widening our funding base from mainly statutory support towards more trust and local community funding.

Strategies for achieving our objects

In delivering skills and training to those needing services at the place they are needed, Pecan seeks to work in partnership with local authorities, national government agencies (such as the Job Centre Plus, the London Development Agency, London Councils and the Skills Funding Agency), local colleges, and other like-minded voluntary sector organisations.

Support is also sought from corporate sponsors, charitable trusts and other supporter groups to enhance and increase our provision. Currently Pecan is delivering contracted services which meet a basic standard of provision as prescribed by the contract holders. Many people accessing our services are in need of more intensive support; over many years Pecan has provided this support and will continue to find ways to provide the level of support needed for those furthest from the job market.

In seeking to meet local communities where they are, we develop partnerships with local churches and other organisations to be able to provide services as locally as possible to the participants we are serving.

Who uses our services

During the financial year 2011-2012 Pecan worked alongside NEET Young people, refugees, asylum seekers, the long term unemployed, those with mental health issues, ex-offenders and their families. All services and support are offered to our participants free of charge. Our funders prescribe the eligibility criteria for participants to come onto our programmes, which vary between contracts, as most services are targeted to meet the needs of specific disadvantaged groups. The majority of our programmes have a focus on supporting people within the London boroughs of Southwark, Lambeth, Greenwich, Wandsworth and Lewisham, although some projects can take people from across London. As our main focus is supporting people into employment, the majority of our programmes are targeting people who are currently unemployed.

Pecan was formed as an expression of the work of the local church. Therefore we consider it vital that we treat every participant, employee, volunteer and stakeholder in a way which reflects the value they have in God's sight. We recognise that disadvantage and discrimination exist in society and Pecan is committed to striving to eliminate these inequalities. We aim to be fair, reasonable and just in all our responsibilities.

Pecan is committed to ensuring that no person or group of persons being recruited for or attending a Pecan course will be treated less favourably than any other person or group of persons because of their race, colour, ethnic or national origins, or because of their religion or belief, gender, sexual orientation, gender re-assignment, disability, appearance, age or marital status.

We consider that unemployed people are excluded from full participation in society. Pecan is committed to action that counteracts this exclusion. In particular, Pecan encourages and trains participants to gain control over their own lives. We intend to ensure requirements or conditions do not unfairly or unjustifiably limit access to services, jobs, or volunteering opportunities. Pecan will actively challenge unlawful discrimination in all forms.

Volunteering

Volunteers continue to be an essential component of our work as a charity and our participants are able to benefit directly from the additional support and wider expertise volunteers can offer. Volunteers are involved in a wide range of our work, both in terms of frontline contact with participants, acting as mentors for our ex-offenders and refugees and as classroom assistants supporting participants in their learning; they also support us in helping with backroom office tasks. Several key volunteers have also taken on the role of covering our Reception and have therefore been the first point of contact for anyone contacting Pecan.

There were 46 volunteers working with the charity during the year in the following main categories:

Fundraising performance

During the financial year 2011-2012, Pecan renewed contracts to deliver Information, Advice & Guidance under the Next Steps contract and the Southwark Works partnership (based on an additional year's funding from Southwark Council). We also received trust funding and voluntary donations towards our Foodbank and 3 years of funding to develop a Work Club project around our Employment Preparation Course materials and experience. Pecan also received funding to develop our internal procedures from Southwark Council's Transition Fund.

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Trustees' Report, incorporating the Directors' Report for the year ended 31 March 2012

The restructuring of the main statutory funding bodies from which Pecan has traditionally received its support, has meant that the majority of funding for our main programmes of work reduced over the year. Throughout the year Pecan has worked with external fundraising support to secure additional trust funds.

Investment performance

Pecan invests reserve bank balances on deposit with a charity investment specialist. Interest earned is shown in the accounts.

Financial Review

Results for the year

The results of the period and financial position of the charity are shown in the annexed financial statements.

The Statement of Financial Activities shows net incoming resources for the year of £57,752 and reserves of £1.231.099.

Tangible fixed assets for use by the charity.

Fixed assets are set out in Note 13 to the accounts.

Reserves Policy

The trustees consider that a policy of holding a minimum of 3 months income as a general reserve is appropriate for the charity. At the end of the year we had 2 months reserves held.

Principal funding sources and how expenditure supports the charity's key objectives

Principal funding sources have been outlined above. With the exception of a small amount of general donations all income is attributed directly to the projects to which it relates, and costs are similarly designated.

We seek to operate a full cost recovery calculation to enable general overheads to be met from the projects we operate.

Plans for future periods

Financially and organisationally Pecan has gone through a difficult period of constriction. The organisation has gone through a major senior level restructure during this financial year. The aim in going forward is to be financially secure whilst delivering the services that give our participants the best opportunities in life.

As Pecan enters its 23rd year a new phase of development has begun. Whilst government backed contracts will continue to play a key role in the financial sustainability of the organisation, they will take a more equal shared role in the financial profile of the organisation. In the business plan for 2012–2014 Pecan has established 6 themes of development. Under these areas there is a mix of contracted, trust funded and self generated income. The focus is always on supporting staff and volunteers to deliver services that provide the best possible support to our participants. The six themes of development are:

- Contract delivery Pecan is committed to increasing the number of government backed contracts and larger trust grants, such as the Big Lottery Fund, that we deliver to support people back into employment or to make more sustainable life choices.
- Influencing To promote the work of Pecan to a wider audience and to increase our profile within the local Christian communities.
- Christian Social Action To develop our position as a practical resource for local churches to deliver social action projects across our
 region. A significant focus of this theme is the development of the reach of Foodbank. Our aim is to be a key partner for churches and
 Christian organisations in being relevant to their community.
- Innovation and Social Enterprise Pecan is seeking to develop new services that do not rely on grants or contracts. We are exploring ways to increase revenue from our building and to trade as a social enterprise, making the most of our High Street position. Alongside this we are actively seeking increased supporter and trust funding to enable us to meet more of the needs of our participants.
- Finance and Governance A review of the governance structures of the organisation have been scheduled to report on this year. This will enable us to ensure that we stay focused on our key support throughout the year. Further to this the Trustees are focusing financial management on securing the reserves policy and ensuring that the organisation develops within its means.
- Volunteer and staff development Volunteers and staff are the lifeblood of the organisation. Pecan is determined to invest in the team to ensure that they grow in numbers, but also that the individuals grow in spirit, skills, passion and security.

Accounting Policies

for the year ended 31 March 2012

1 Accounting policies

Accounting Convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with:

- a) the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008);
- b) the recommendations of the Statement of Recommended Practice 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities' (SORP 2005), published in March 2005.
- c) the Companies Act 2006.

Deferred income

Income received which is contractually or otherwise not expendable until a future period is deferred.

Incoming Resources

Incoming resources are the amounts derived from the provision of charitable services, the receipt of gifts, subscriptions and grants falling within the charity's ordinary activities and are shown net of VAT where applicable.

Endowment funds

Endowment funds are restricted funds which are capital in nature. Permanent endowments exist where there is no power to convert the capital into income. The funds can reduce where there are decreases in value, either by losses or depreciation, of assets represented by

Restricted Funds

Restricted funds are to be used for specified purposes as laid down by the funder. Direct and support expenditure which meets these criteria are identified to the fund together with a fair allocation of other costs.

Unrestricted Funds

Unrestricted funds are funds received which have no restrictions placed on their use and are available as general funds.

Designated Funds

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for particular purposes.

Revenue grants

Revenue grants are credited to incoming resources on the earlier of when they are received or when they are due. If they relate to a specified future period they are deferred.

Allocation of costs

Costs are allocated directly to projects where they can be identified as relating solely to that project. Other costs are allocated between the funds based on staff time spent on the fund activities or other appropriate criteria.

Governance costs

These are costs associated with the governance arrangements of the charity which relate to the general running of the charity as opposed to those costs associated with fundraising or charitable activity.

Tangible Fixed Assets

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Land & buildings- 2% on costOffice equipment- 50% on costFurniture & fittings- 25% on costMotor vehicles- 25% on cost

Items of equipment are only capitalised where the purchase price exceeds £1,000.

Stocks

Stock is valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

Pensions

The charity operates defined contribution schemes which are administered by outside independent pensions providers. Contributions payable for the year are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities.

The incoming resources and surplus are attributable to the principal activities of the charity.
